CSBG Eligible Entity Management Accomplishments

In 2024, the CSBG Assistant Director became a Nationally Certified Results Oriented Management and Accountability (ROMA) Implementer. This certification enhanced Campesinos Unidos, Inc.'s (CUI) ability to align services with measurable outcomes. The certification empowered CSBG staff with the tools and knowledge necessary to assess program effectiveness, identify service gaps, and make data-driven decisions for continuous improvement.

The ROMA training emphasized the importance of fostering a culture of accountability, which led to more efficient and effective program oversight. Additionally, CSBG management staff became more informed and better equipped to align program goals with community needs. This accomplishment demonstrates how informed leadership contributed to more strategic decision-making and enhanced service delivery.

Innovative Solutions Highlights

CSBG paid staff addressed the issue of poverty among farmworkers through an innovative outreach effort in collaboration with various local partners, including the California Employment Development Department, California Rural Legal Assistance, the County of Imperial, Imperial Valley Food Bank, Catholic Charities, Neighborhood House of Calexico, the Imperial Valley Housing Authority, and others.

On December 6th, 2024, CSBG paid staff took part in the Annual Farmworker Breakfast in Calexico, California, an event aimed at meeting farmworkers in their own environment. The outreach occurred from 11:00 p.m. to 5:00 a.m. at a local gathering point where farmworkers wait to board buses for their shifts. During this effort, CSBG staff distributed 1,000 backpacks and connected with over 2,500 farmworkers to provide them with information regarding services they may be eligible for.

This outreach initiative, supported by CSBG funds, represented both a creative solution to meet the community's needs and a strong commitment to reaching vulnerable populations in a convenient and accessible manner. The collaboration with multiple agencies allowed for a broad and effective outreach effort that directly tackled the lack of access to resources contributing to poverty. By bringing resources to farmworkers in a way that accommodated their schedules, CSBG staff successfully engaged with them in a unique and effective way.

State and CSBG Eligible Entity Continuous Improvement

As a direct result of the ROMA certification, CUI implemented a written prioritization technique to determine which needs, identified through program evaluations and the community needs assessment, would be addressed. The process enabled the agency to focus its resources on the most pressing causes of poverty, ensuring that services were aligned with the greatest areas of need. By creating a methodology for evaluating community needs and assessing past program performance, CUI enhanced its responsiveness to the community, improved service delivery, and increased the overall effectiveness of its programs.
